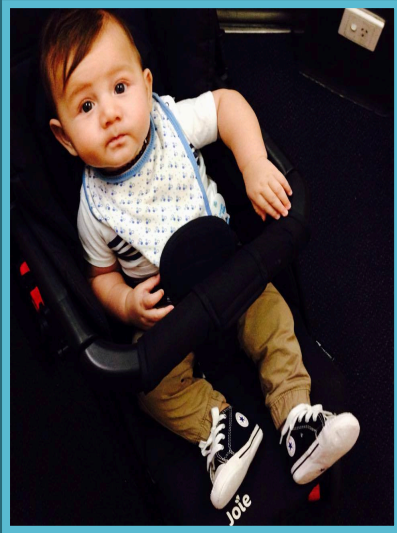

The Kōhanga Reo O Rangaunu, situated behind Waimanoni marae, is a place for families to learn the language, stories and tikanga of their whānau. Catering to Tamariki of up to 5 years, the activities of the whānau clearly show children are the focus of this kōhanga reo. Encompassing programmes which include good quality te reo Māori is only but part of the work Kaimahi deliver to these children.

The Kōhanga reo recently celebrated their 30th birthday, a trip down memory lane for those who attended the celebration. Whanau who were welcomed with a Powhiri, were able to reflect upon the achievements of the Kōhanga and also acknowledge the support that it has contributed to past and present tauira (students) and kaiako. The unveiling and presentation of the Kōhanga reo's Plaque was soon followed by a variety of performances from Purapura & surrounding Kura Kaupapa who were invited to partake in the days celebration.

Unveiling of Wikitoria & He Au Tōna

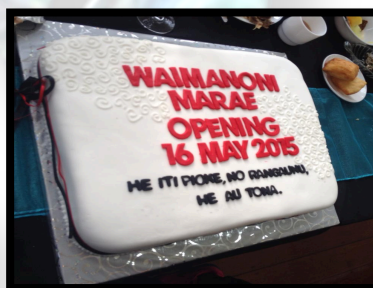
On the 16th of May, Waimanoni Marae held their official opening with a blessing of the new Wharenuī (Wikitoria) & Wharekai (He Au Tōna).

Hekenukumai (Hector) Busby led out the 5am Dawn Ceremony accompanied by Te Reinga Patuwairua and Maraea Natanahira Awarau (Marsden) who were given the role of Puhi, a honour bestowed upon them by Kaumatua & Kuia of Waimanoni.

A lot of planning and preparation saw the event well attended by whanau who travelled near and far to make the special occasion with Representatives from Tainui, Ngati Hine & many others, showing support was in abundance as they gathered outside the Marae.

Saturday boasted as a day of Whanaungatanga, a time of remembering those who have gone before us, & who are still here continuing their support towards the Marae. A big mihi to all those who worked tirelessly to complete the Marae in time for the opening and who contributed to a momentous day.

On Sunday, following a morning service, Kuia were presented pillows embroidered with Waiata by the Smith whanau, gifts described as precious and thoughtful. The day allowed for the home crowd to bare farewell to whanau making the journey home after an eventful weekend.



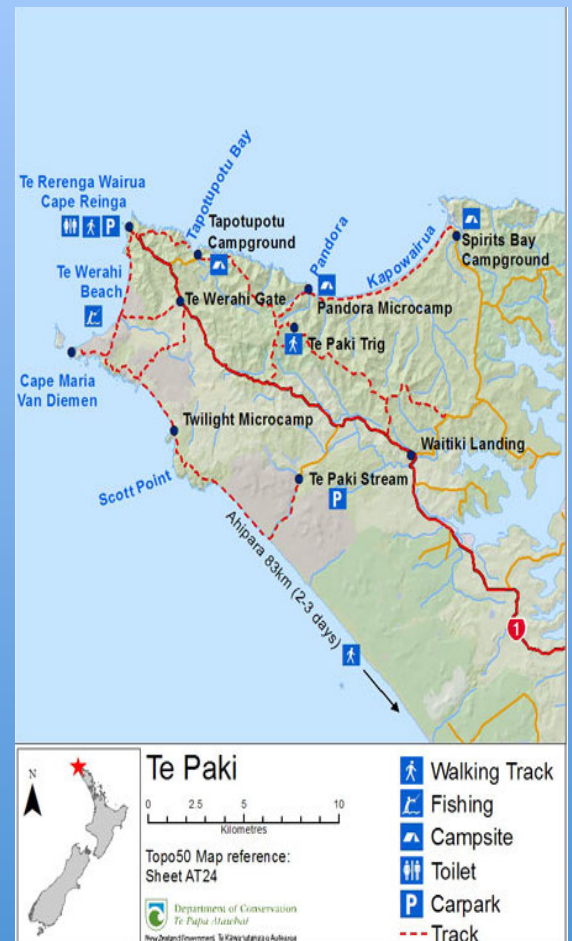
Tane Hikoi – Leadership Growth For NgaiTakoto

This journey took a roopu of young men and challenged them on a 6-hour hikoi from Tapotupotu to Kapowairua (Spirits Bay) ending their hikoi at Rangaunu Harbour.

An Initiative Lead by NgaiTakoto Environmentalist Kaio Hooper, the Tane Hikoi is about building the capacity of our younger generations for future leadership roles within NgaiTakoto and to return to the whenua and historical stories of our Tupuna to clearly identify a sense of who we are and where we come from.
